Due to a scheduling accident, one Waffle House worker was left alone to run the entire restaurant on a Sunday night.

Ethan Crispo was just one of about 30 hungry customers who wanted food at midnight. After sitting at his table for a while, he noticed there was just one upset employee available to take orders, cook

food, clean tables and manage the cash register.

The 24-year-old patron was losing hope of ever getting a meal. The employee — who was recognized only by his name tag reading “Ben” — seemed to be on the edge of panic until Crispo saw him speaking to a male customer in a blue shirt sitting at the counter. After a brief conversation, Ben handed him an apron (围裙) and the man got to work washing dishes.

“It was a transition so smooth. I initially assumed it was a staff member returning to his shift,” Crispo told AL.com. “It wasn’t. It was a kind stranger.”

A couple of minutes later, a woman in high heels and a stylish dress walked behind the counter to make more coffee. She then took a few orders before resigning herself to clearing tables. Suddenly, a third customer in a red shirt marched over to help as well, though Crispo failed to catch his name or take a photo of the man at work.

The term “customer service” took on a whole new meaning that night. “It was the most fascinating thing,” Crispo said. “It was just one of the wildest instances of really, really cool people just coming together. It made a difference to many people that night. Certainly, their actions made an impact on me,” he added. “Humanity isn’t just good — it’s great.”

C

A fully electric seaplane has made its first flight over the mouth of the Fraser River near Vancouver, Canada. The flight represents a milestone in the long process of reducing the aviation (航空) industry’s emissions (尾气排放) and costs by electrifying (使电气化) short to medium distance commercial flying.

Several hundred people crowded the river bank on Tuesday morning to witness what they hoped would be a historic moment. They were not disappointed. Among cheers, the battery-powered Harbour Air seaplane lifted off into the sky. The plane flew a short round-trip downriver before landing five minutes later.

“It was magical. It was much quieter than I had expected it to be,” said Nicki Malcom, one witness from Auburn, Washington. “It’s definitely the future,” said Chip Jamison, who came from Portland to see the electric plane he produced parts for. “You can see it with automobiles. Planes are next. It’s right in front of us.”

The test pilot was the only person on board the six-passenger DHC-2 de Havilland Beaver. He was the CEO and founder of Harbour Air, Greg McDougall. McDougall’s seaplane airline teamed up with a Redmond, Washington-based electric motor maker named MagniX to transform the classic de Havilland Beaver plane. MagniX CEO Roei Ganzarski sees the seaplane’s first flight as a milestone, similar to the first jet takeoff.

“Today you witnessed the first shot of the electric aviation revolution,” Ganzarski told the two companies’ staff, contractors, media and other celebrators. “Let’s start the revolution.” Ganzarski laid out a case for how battery-powered flight offers lower noise, zero pollution and could reduce fuel and maintenance costs. “Lower operating costs for airlines like Harbour Air will mean lower ticket prices for all of you,” he said. “Lower operating costs mean they can now fly to more destinations that we couldn’t fly to before.”

It will be some time before regular folks can book a ticket on a clean, electric seaplane.

There are many online and in-person courses that promise to teach a “native accent”. But is it really necessary to sound exactly like a native speaker? Some experts say it is not. Eusebia V. Mont leads the Accent Modification (修正) Program at the University of Maryland’s Department of Hearing & Speech Sciences. Mont talked about it to reporters.

Students come to the program for one or two school terms. They meet in a group for 90 minutes a week. Each student meets with one other student and a “doctor” for more individual work. Altogether the program amounts to about 60 hours of learning in class. Mont says the rate of

progress absolutely depends on the type of accent it is, how long they've been speaking English and how often they speak English.

Mont says, "I view accent as the spread of culture; the spread of a person's individual identity — and I don't work to remove any part of culture from an individual."

Students will most probably work in English-speaking environments when they leave school. The program teaches them tools for this. For example, they learn how to give an "elevator pitch" — a short description of an idea — and how to discuss their research. They also practice interviewing and giving presentations at work.

Mont says that there are a few methods for modifying accent, but most have the same basis. One method is called the Compton Method. Arthur J. Compton developed the method for English learners who know English vocabulary and grammar fairly well. It begins with a test to find out how the student's native language affects different areas of pronunciation. Then, learners use practice materials to record their own voice and compare their pronunciation attempts to recordings of a native speaker.

Another method is the Tomatis Method, which uses special headphones and includes listening to electronically modified voices and asks students to find the difference between their pronunciation and the voices they hear. This method is also used to cure children who have mental conditions that can cause difficulty in language learning.

Mont's final advice to English learners is not to expect to sound exactly like a native speaker. And remember: even native English speakers do not all speak alike!

Body positivity refers to the idea that all people deserve to have a positive body image, regardless of how society and popular culture view ideal shape, size and appearance.

Body positivity has its roots in the fat acceptance movement of the late 1960s. 36 The

National Association to Advance Fat Acceptance was first established in 1969. 37

Some of the goals of the body positivity movement include challenging how society views people, addressing unrealistic body standards and helping people build confidence and acceptance of their own bodies. The current form of body positivity movement began to appear around 2012. 38 As the movement grew in popularity, the original focus on acceptance of weight began to shift toward a message that “all bodies are beautiful.”

One of the major goals of body positivity is to address some of the ways that body image influences mental health and well-being. 39 It can even affect how they judge their self-worth. Research suggests that having a negative body image is associated with an increased risk for some mental conditions including depression, low self-esteem (自尊心) and eating disorders.

40 The hope is that people will then be able to adjust their body expectations and feel more positive about their own bodies. Such acceptance may then help deal with the negative effects that a poor body image has on mental and physical health.

In a study led by Stanford University, home-based workers proved to be more productive, happier and less likely to quit. The 41 side? Those working from home were half as likely to be promoted as their office-based colleagues. They were also lonely: 50% of them 42 to return to the office. In my opinion, deciding to work from home is not a 43 idea.

Working from home can be lonely. Don't overlook how personal collaboration, 44 social connections formed in the workplace, can 45 future opportunities, including a greater 46 of promotion. While the symptoms of loneliness may be hard to 47, job burnout can happen when you are 48 at home with your pet dog at your feet.

Depending on your work style, you may be less 49. Are you an outgoing person who can 50 their greatest potential when 51 up with others on projects? Do you get energy and inspiration from the kind of spontaneous socializing that 52 during breaks, lunches and conversations on the way to the parking lot? If so, the unsocial nature of working from home might 53 your energy.

Working from home can also be distracting (分心的). Do you have roommates who work at night and 54 at home during the day? Are you a parent who is caring for a baby while 55 to concentrate on computer work for several hours? Even those who find themselves more 56 in their home office will find such interruptions challenging to their productivity.

Do you hope to join the workforce that now works from home? If 57, do some soul-searching before telling your boss that you 58 you'd be more productive. Before deciding to do it, talk to co-workers, friends and those in your networking circle, especially people who work
